

### Policy Submission on the Integration of the SDGs in the Local Economic and Community Plan.

Established in 2014, Galway City Community Network (GCCN) is the network of community, voluntary and environmental organisations, and groups active in Galway City. As the Public Participation Network for Galway City, GCCN is the main link through which the local authority, agencies and the state connect with the community, voluntary and environmental sectors in Galway City. GCCN is committed to contributing to the development and achievement of a vision for the well-being of this and future generations.

GCCN convenes the Sustainable Development Goals Working Group which coordinates 'Seed Nine: Advance capacity and commitment to drive implementation of the UN Sustainable Development Goals' (hereafter the SDG's). This is a cross-sectoral Working Group which sets out to promote the SDGs, make them relevant for Galway, and establish the means for advancing their implementation through mainstream policies, plans and programmes.

The SDG Working Group welcome the opportunity to submit to the LECP consultation and to advocate for the clear integration of the SDGs into the forthcoming LECP on the following grounds.

Of primary importance is the fact that the SDGs are an integral part of the urgent and time sensitive response to climate change<sup>1</sup>, one of the greatest challenges to economic and social development. In addition to driving action for climate change, the attainment of the SDG's can drive wellbeing, and

inclusion in the public sphere<sup>2</sup>, in addition to sustainable infrastructures and economic growth. This is in line with the overall goal of LECP's to promote the social, economic, and environmental interests of local communities<sup>3</sup>.

It is also important to note that the aspirations expressed in the SDGs cannot be separated from the framework of human rights<sup>4</sup>. The Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty is a legal obligation derived from Section 42 of the Irish Human Rights and Equality Act 2014. This Act places a statutory obligation on public institutions to protect the human rights of those to whom they provide services in the execution of their functions. The Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty outlines nine protected grounds for protection that are relevant to groups at risk of marginalization. For this reason, there is room for the expansion of targeted groups within this plan. For instance, marginalised groups known to face discrimination and harassment, but are not included in the consideration of safe, inclusive communities as yet. This would have relevance to SDG 16 and the Global Framework Indicator 16.b.1 Proportion of population reporting having personally felt discriminated against or harassed in the previous 12 months on the basis of a ground of discrimination prohibited under international human rights law.

Finally, the SDG global framework of indicators can serve multiple functions, framing reports, measuring progress and performance, and as a management tool for the development of implementation strategies and the allocation of resources<sup>5</sup>. It is noted that in the LECP Issues Paper particular SDG's will be addressed under each goal, although it is not yet indicated how this will be achieved. This issue must be addressed as Social Justice Ireland's Sustainable Progress Index 2022<sup>6</sup> ranked Ireland 10th of 14 comparable EU countries (Sweden, Denmark, The Netherlands, and Finland were the top four countries in that order) in terms of progression towards SDG attainment. This means that Ireland has much catching up to do and the SDG Global Framework of Indicators is presented as a tool to advance progress in this area.

It is also recommended here that the SDG Working Group along with other relevant stakeholders in the public sphere should be included in decision-making processes at a local level in order to ensure

transparency and accountability in line with SDG 16.7 responsive, inclusive, participatory, and representative decision-making at all levels.

We are aware that the contents of the LECP will evolve due to public consultation, however developing a clear frame for evaluation will ensure that progress towards the SDG's is ensured. The following frame presented below outlines how the programmes and priorities of the LECP can be linked to the UN SDG Global Framework of Indicators (or a modified version) as a barometer of performance. Not all of the relevant SDG's will have an indicator that captures the goals of certain priorities and programmes, and other indictors must be sought sources (e.g., Social Justice Ireland 2022). Nonetheless, the inclusion of a clearly defined agenda that is linked to relevant indicators of the Global Framework in the forthcoming LECP will ensure measurable accountable progress which is vital to SDG Indicator 17.18.1 statistical capacity for Sustainable Development Goal monitoring.
