## Housing for All – Pathway 2

## Pathway to Eradicating Homelessness, Increasing Social Housing Delivery and Supporting Social Inclusion.

Amongst the pathways contained in *Housing for All* is the *Pathway to Eradicating Homelessness, Increasing Social Housing Delivery and Supporting Social Inclusion.* This pathway is underpinned by a range of actions to address homelessness with an ultimate goal of working to end homelessness by 2030.

Housing for All recognises that reducing and preventing homelessness is a top priority for the Government and there is a particular focus on reducing the number of homeless families and individuals. The Government is committed to a housing-led approach as the primary response to all forms of homelessness. This includes the prevention of loss of existing housing through the provision of adequate support to people in their homes, as well as significant enhancements to secure tenancies in the private rented sector. *Housing for All* sets out the strategic direction for policy and actions on homelessness at national level and the policies outlined therein should inform amendments to, and reviews of, existing Homelessness Action Plans. *Housing for All* also recognises the criticality of interagency supports which are required to address the complex combination of social, health and economic needs of homeless persons and those at risk of homelessness, in addition to their specific housing need.

Housing for All contains further actions in relation to addressing housing supply, affordability, issues in the rented sector and refurbishment/renewal. While supply is critical to ensuring there is sufficient accommodation for all, the actions specifically targeting homelessness recognise the complexity and variety of factors leading to homelessness and issues for some households in sustaining tenancies, and seeks to support and end homelessness for those affected.

In setting overall aims and objectives of a Homelessness Action Plan, the core principles set out in *Housing for All* should be to the fore. *Housing Policy Objective 3: Work towards Ending Homelessness by 2030*, is the underpinning objective for the 18 actions specifically aimed at addressing homelessness. Each action includes a timeline for delivery as well as a designated responsible body or bodies. It is important that Homelessness Action Plans contain measures to address relevant Actions, particularly those that are identified as to be led by Local Authorities, or jointly led with other key agencies involved in the preparation of the Homelessness Action Plans (including the HSE and TUSLA). Any measure included will need to set out how the measure will be progressed and monitored.

## 6.1 The Eradication of Homelessness

Reducing and Preventing Homelessness, with the ultimate goal of ending homelessness is a key objective of *Housing for All*. The Minister, with the support of the Government has already signed the 'Lisbon Declaration on the European Platform on Combatting Homelessness'. In signing the declaration, Ireland has agreed to promote the prevention of homelessness, access to permanent housing and the provision of enabling support services to those who are homeless. The Declaration commits to working towards ending homelessness by 2030 and this commitment has been reaffirmed in *Housing for All*. This will involve working with the relevant stakeholders and supporting policy measures with adequate funding. Measures set out in the Homelessness Action Plans should be framed in terms of that overall objective.

Action 3.1 of *Housing for All* confirms the Department's commitment to, "actively participate through the newly established European Platform on Combatting Homelessness to advance the Lisbon Declaration on Combatting Homelessness signed in June 2021." There is a strong emphasis on reducing the number of homeless families and individuals, and supporting people experiencing homelessness into long-term sustainable accommodation. Actions to work towards this key objective, consistent with the aforementioned priorities should underpin Homelessness Action Plans, i.e. the prevention of homelessness, access to permanent housing and the provision of enabling support services to those who are homeless.
