	Housing SPC Meeting – Homeless Update November 2023
Homeless Services and Supports	The recently published homelessness report for October 2023 indicates that 209 individual adults were accessing emergency accommodation in Galway City similar to September. Overall, the West Region has experienced an increase in homelessness of 360 adults in October up from 352 in September 2023.
	79 families accessed emergency accommodation in Galway City in September 2023. This shows a decrease of since August of approximately 4 families (78). Securing Private Emergency Accommodation options is continues to be a serious challenge in the City which is adding to the challenges on service users and providers.
	Temporary Emergency Accommodation: Fairgreen Hostel and Abbey House provide emergency accommodation to 40 men and Osterley Lodge provides emergency accommodation to 12 women. Services are managed by COPE Galway and Galway Simon Community and remain at full capacity. The family Hubs remain at capacity and challenges remain for families in sourcing HAP accommodation.
	Housing First: Housing First supports are provided by Galway Simon and Cope Galway to West Region under the Implementation Plan for Housing First 2022 – 2026. The plan from January 2022 a target set at 30 new Housing first tenancies over the 5 year period. The City Council are working with Galway Simon and Cope Galway to source and purchase one bed units under CAS. A number of tenancies have been sourced from Council Stock and AHBs. However, it remains challenging to find good quality one bedroom accommodation in the city. Under the new plan 17 tenancies in the City have been created.
	Rough Sleepers Outreach Service: Cope Galway staff with the support of a GP and nurse provide an outreach service a number of times per week to those who are not availing of the homeless accommodation services. Supports and information are offered to this group including medical services. There a number of non-nationals sleeping out in this cohort and work is ongoing to achieve a long-term outcome to their homelessness.
	Cold Weather Response Winter 2023/24 is a low threshold, short term winter response with the primary aim of reducing risks of harm to people associated with rough sleeping in wintry weather. The overall objectives are to; minimise the risk of harm to people without shelter, particularly those who are rough sleeping, due to the cold and inclement weather conditions over the winter period; to work with people in identifying and progressing routes out of rough sleeping and homelessness and to act as a referral point to accommodation, housing, health and recovery services. The CWR will operate from November 2023 and April, 2024 in a unit leased by the Council in the East of the

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	City on a night-to-night basis. The CWR will be managed by COPE Galway on behalf of Galway City Council. Weekly meetings regarding clients will be held with the Homeless Unit to ensure appropriate supports are put in place for the clients using the service.					
	Homeless Travellers: The Council, with the support of Homeless Service Providers, assists with the provision of emergency accommodation, support and transition services to Travellers. The Homeless HAP Placefinder Officer continues to work with Travellers to secure a HAP supported tenancy. Allocation of units (LA/AHB) continue to be made to the families in homeless services having regard to Scheme of Letting Priorities and Estate Management Strategy. Traveller families continue to be challenged in finding private rented accommodation.

New Schemes / Proposals	SQ Road Day Centre proposal: The proposed development aims to provide a much-needed upgrade in the existing day centre facilities, along with additional resources. It will also accommodate temporary homeless accommodation year-round, with the focus on identifying and progressing routes out of rough sleeping and homelessness on a regular basis while also adapting during the winter months to increase the intake of vulnerable rough sleepers. The Stage 2 Application for the above was submitted to the Department on Friday 22nd July 2022. Stage 2 approval with a recommended budget of €4,215,073 was received in October 2022. Part 8 planning notification was published on the 8th December 2022 and the Part 8 approval for the scheme was received on 8th May 2023. This will now be progressed to design stage and delivery and completion date in Q2/3 2025.					
	Newcastle Rd: Stage 4 application was approved (€2,718,376) issued on 17 th April 2023 to Galway Simon Community who are proposing to construct 10 single bedroomed housing units for older people and for those who have compromised mobility or who are wheelchair users. This housing development will be well managed and offer security to older people including older homeless service users. It will have a very significant social value and location is excellent in terms of proximity to public transport, amenities and services.
